TTLH's Biggest Take Away from the 23-24 academic year

Key questions for teachers to consider:

- 1. Do your learners understand why they are learning a language?
- 2. Do they appreciate the additional benefits learning a language brings to their life?
- 3. How do your learners think they'll use the language they are learning in the future? Do your lessons support them to move closer to these goals?
- 4. What do your learners want to be able to communicate?
- 5. Do your learners have opportunities to use the skills they are developing in lessons or through extra-curricular activities?
- 6. Can your learners see they are making progress and that they are gradually able to communicate more?
- 7. Do your learners have any say over what they learn?
- 8. Do the topics and themes in lessons feel relevant and relatable to their lives?

- Coordinate resources to support HHCL accreditation at GCSE and A Level.
- Develop a sustainable network of HHCL examiners within TTLH's geographical reach.
- Strengthen the profile of HHCL through TTLH communications and social media.
- Run three virtual HHCL teach-meets in the 24-25 academic year for Hub schools.
- Identify and support schools to share best practice in HHCL provision.
- Establish links with schools outside the hub area
- Attend NCLE universal CPD webinars on HHCL.

Looking for something students could complete outside lesson time?



The British Council has a wealth of European Day of Language activities on their website.

The European Day of Languages website has a Language Challenge handbook with 51 challenges encouraging learners to step outside their comfort zone. There's even a languages challenge app focusing on authentic every-day communication tasks.

Looking for something to incorporate into your lessons?



Explore individual linguistic identities using <u>https://www.multilingualism-in-</u> <u>schools.net/language-</u> <u>portraits/</u> for inspiration. What languages do your learners know, like or have experience of? What makes up their own linguistic identity?

Have you heard about WoLLoW? The World of Languages and Languages of the World is an exciting new curriculum which explores how languages work and the history of English as well as exploring all past and present world languages. There are free taster lessons available on their <u>website</u>.





What's in a word? Explore how words can open our eyes to new ways of looking at things. Take inspiration from books like 'What a Wonderful Word' or have a look at the British Council resources available in their let's talk about languages download.

Celebrate the linguistic 'super-powers' in your classroom by showcasing the range of languages spoken by young people in your classroom. Make a sign for the door or bunting for the walls. Take it one step further by learning greetings or tongue twisters in the different languages.





Tasked with delivering the European Day of Language Assembly?

How can we make our subject real and relevant to the young people in front of us?

Telling young people that learning another language will: 1. open doors,

2. might lead to increased pay Or

3. will enable them to travel the world **probably won't have** the impact you are looking for!

Show-case the opportunities languages have given you or other members of staff in school. Make it feel **real and relatable** by sharing pictures and funny anecdotes. Don't forget to include the **lasting impact** learning languages has had on your life.





What's even better than your experience? Could you contact ex-students who have benefited from opportunities because of language study? Ask them to send in short video clips or a quote with some pictures. Even better – would they be willing to come back to school to speak in the assembly?

Show your learners how languages can sit perfectly alongside STEM subjects and can actually become their Unique Selling Point. Keep coming back to this message throughout the year.



Use your assembly to launch a pupil voice listening activity to find out what your students think about their language provision. What they like? What they don't like? And what they would like to see as part of the provision moving forward? Have you considered a language ambassador scheme in school? Using KS4 or KS5 students to support you to raise the profile of languages. They could offer in-lesson support, run extracurricular activities, and support with the ongoing promotion of languages in school.

Fully-funded opportunity for pupils aged 16-18 with an interest in German and STEM subjects.

The Goethe-Institut is delighted to introduce the "Karriere Quantum" camps for students aged 16-18. A week-long opportunities focusing on quantum technologies with a German language twist. The project is funded by the German Federal Ministry of Education and Research and organised by the Goethe-Institut in collaboration with TüftelLab.

Dates: Rome, Italy: Saturday, 2 November - Saturday, 9 November 2024 (application deadline: 15 September 2024)

Who can apply: Groups consisting of two students and one teacher. Students must be between 16-18 years old. An interest in STEM subjects is an advantage, but applications from all subjects are welcome. Language proficiency: The camps will be held in English. Students should have an A1 German level, teachers do not require German proficiency.

Scholarships: Full funding for all participating students and teachers (including flights, accommodation, catering, insurance).
