What are you trying to achieve by promoting European Day of Languages?



Before you put your assembly or activities for the day together, think carefully about the message you want the young people in your school to take away.



Avoid the clichés. Telling a young person in year 5 or year 8 that learning a language might make them more employable in the future, is unlikely to have the impact you were hoping for.



Instead, focus on how learning a language will enrich a young person's life right now by developing crucial skills which build character, the ability to communicate and the opportunity to explore other places in the world including culture, customs, music, art, literature and people.



Share examples of how technology can bring all these opportunities to their fingertips. You don't have to wait until you are in another country to enjoy and benefit from learning the language.



A little goes a long way! Reinforce the message that you don't have to be fluent to use your language skills. Learning another language is about communicating, connecting with new people and building relationships. You can do that with one or two simple words!



Get creative and showcase the wealth of languages spoken in your school.

Do you know how many different languages are spoken in your school by members of staff and students? Now's the time to find out! Once you know you can approach a group of willing volunteers to record a short video. Ask the aspiring film stars to say hello and I speak xxxx in the language. Then ask them to share their favourite word and what it means in English. The video could be shown in an assembly or at the start of language lessons with an interactive quiz or competition.

You could also celebrate the linguistic 'super-powers' in your classroom by showcasing the range of languages spoken by young people in your classroom. Make a sign for the door or bunting for the walls. Take it one step further by learning greetings or tongue twisters in the different languages.
